Upholstery Courses in the Heart of Rathfriland



Southern Regional College (SRC) delivers community based recreational upholstery workshops in the centre of Rathfriland town. The courses take place in the Rathfriland HUB placed in the town's main square. The HUB was set up by Rathfriland and District Regeneration Company which has been in existence for over 30 years. The company are based on promoting equality, good relations & inclusion. They aim to bring the whole community together by providing a neutral space where people of all ages and backgrounds can participate in activities in a relaxed and comfortable environment.

The recreational upholstery courses allow people living in the Rathfriland and surrounding rural area to learn the basic, but useful upholstery skills such as providing furniture, especially seats, with padding, springs, webbing, and fabric or leather covers. These skills equip students with the ability to transform old furniture. The classes are specifically aimed at residents who live in Rathfriland and surrounding rural area and find it difficult to attend classes in the college's campuses or are under time restrictions due to family commitments.

Rathfriland and District Regeneration Company has been working with SRC using the HUB for several years providing various courses in upholstery, computers, dress making to facilitate to the learning and skill needs of residents.

SRC and the Rathfriland HUB have set up the upholstery and dressmaking courses below to take place in Rathfriland HUB September 2023 and January 2024. WALD Centre Cullyhanna



SRC has worked closely with the WALD centre in Cullyhanna since it first opened in 2001. During this time, we have delivered a range of courses from recreational, through to level 2, level 3 and beyond. The WALD Centre is an official out-centre of Southern Regional College with an onsite computer suite in the building for use in community education and training.

Every semester, we run a variety of courses such as Level 1 and 2 Book-Keeping; Level 2 Payroll; Paediatric First Aid, Level 2 Awareness of the Autism Spectrum, Level 3 in Working with Children & Young People with Special Needs and Essential Skills Literacy, Numeracy, and ICT.

The centre facilitates an average of 12 students in each class ranging in age from late teens to learners in their 80s. Many students have young families, and some do not have access to transport, so without this locally based centre, they would be unable to access further education and training.

The WALD centre plays an important role in ensuring local people in South Armagh and beyond have access to a whole range of programmes and training opportunities.

The input of the WALD staff is invaluable. They are dedicated to listening to local people, discussing their learning needs, promoting classes, encouraging, and supporting students to secure qualifications and progress on their lifelong learning journey. This in turn ensures we are providing a portfolio of relevant training.

The Grow Project Having a Positive Impact on the Environment

Training on the GROW Project commenced in October 2022 with 34 residents from Armagh and Craigavon Neighbourhood Renewal Areas (NRAs) participating in a recreational horticulture programme. 24 of the residents went on to participate and achieve OCN Carbon literacy Level 1 Award that focused on Horticulture and its impact on the environment. The latter Carbon Literacy course was a unique and new opportunity for residents to gain a skill and qualification in a vitally important area of expertise in today's world. The course enabled the residents to have the knowledge and capacity required to create a positive shift in how they live their life, work and behave in response to climate change. The Carbon Literacy Project which the Grow project takes direction defines Carbon Literacy as "an awareness of the carbon costs and impacts of everyday activities and the ability and motivation to reduce emissions, on an individual, community and organisational basis." As well as achieving a valuable certificate and skills one other strong reason for the residents doing the Carbon literacy course was to input their newly acquired knowledge back into their own community and to help at a societal level to make a positive difference to the environment.

The Grow project focused on Carbon literacy within Public Community green space (allotments, community gardens etc.). Throughout the duration of the GROW project residents promoted the benefits of the project within their own local communities. They shared excess produce with neighbours and discuss the processes involved, helping others to begin in growing their own produce in an environmentally friendly way. This has further helped promote a healthier lifestyle in their own communities:



SRC Students Harnessing the Wind

As part of the Department for Communities funded training initiatives residents from Armagh, Craigavon and Newry Neighbourhood Renewal Areas through the Southern Regional College participated in the Oceans project. The project working alongside Arch training in Enniskillen offered residents a four-day course working on wind turbine technology. The technology allows wind turbines to extract power from the wind and convert to electricity. This project offers Global Wind Organisation (GWO) approved Basic Safety Training (BST) in wind turbines. The course provided residents with a range of important skills and tools including, Safety, Fire Awareness, First Aid, Working at Heights and Manual Handling. All training is designed for technicians working on wind turbines onshore and offshore. The GWO training addresses procedures and equipment commonly used in wind turbines. The project also supported residents with free transport to training and catering.

The OCEANs project had 20 residents commence various training in training. Smaller groups of residents did other shorter courses, such as 3 of them doing Confined Spaces training and 2 Scaffolding Inspections training. 15 residents commenced in the Global Wind Safety basic training in Enniskillen with Arch training. 3 of the residents went on to secure employment.

Local Residents 'REAP' the Benefit of an Employment Funded Project

In collaboration with Southwest College (SWC), Southern Regional College (SRC) accelerated progress in Northern Ireland through the Rural Economic Accelerator Programme (REAP). This project was funded by the Community Renewal Fund and its main aim was to focus on contributing to creating a sustainable and prosperous NI. The project set out to provide residents with skills, qualifications, and eventually jobs. All those residents who engaged on the project were unemployed or economically inactive people from Cookstown, Dungannon, Enniskillen, Omagh, Armagh, Banbridge and Craigavon. As a result of the joint effort SRC was able to help 30 residents gain a qualification and 35 secure meaningful employment, including self-employment. The type of areas of skill the project delivered qualifications and licences in were RITTB forklift licence, CSR card, SIA security licence, Food Hygiene & First Aid certificates etc. Some of the business that provided employment for the residents were McMullan Facades, Molloy's Engineering, Northlands.



Why are SRC's TOPs & STEPS Projects Such a Success?

The Training and Employment Opportunities Programme (TOPS) Craigavon & Newry and Supporting Training and Employment (STEPS) Armagh Projects continue to change lives In the Armagh, Lurgan, Brownlow, Newry and Portadown Neighbourhood Renewal Areas. Tens of people are gaining valuable workrelated qualifications, and some have found employment.

This year these projects have upskilled over 195 residents from Neighbourhood Renewal Areas across the southern region who were unemployed or on low incomes. The projects are funded by the Department for Communities as part of its Neighbourhood Renewal Strategy. The strategy aims to directly link residents with skills that satisfy the needs of employers in the local area and regionally. The type of qualifications/ licences that the project focused on this year are IAB Payroll and Bookkeeping, Cat C lorry driving, Counterbalance forklift driving, City & Guilds Level 2 Award in Nail Technologies, Paediatric First Aid, CSR card for construction, Children's behavioural/ special needs, SIA and PSA Door Supervision and HEIGHTs training. A unique element of the project is to help residents overcome personal barriers to finding employment by funding their training courses and travel to locations.

The key purpose of the TOPs and STEPs projects is to assist residents in the Armagh, Lurgan, Brownlow, Newry and Portadown areas in gaining valuable qualifications that assist in finding employment but also to help people make positive changes to their lives. One resident said, "My mental health had suffered badly over covid, being able to complete a NRA course allowed me to not only build my confidence and meet others but I gained a qualification." Another resident said "I had a really bad experience of school when I was younger and thought I was stupid. After completing 2 NRA courses I now know I am not and have applied for the access course to pursue my dream career of being a nurse." A third resident said "The courses offered through NRA have provided me with opportunities I would never get. Having the childcare on site allows me to progress my education and CV while my kids are young and allow me to build a better future for my family." Most residents on the projects say that the courses equip them with the necessary skills to enable them to obtain work or change their lives.

Harbour Skills & Jobs (HS&J) Project

The HS&J project was funded by the DAERA and the SEAFLAG as part of the Community-led Local Development (CLLD) initiative for County Down fishing communities. As the initiative was aimed directly at regenerating County Down fishing communities SRC worked intensively with SEAFLAG Board and several businesses in Kilkeel, Clanrye Group, Kilkeel Development Association, JBOs and other local organisations to provide valuable input to the development of the project. This process allowed local stakeholders to have a meaningful role in deciding what interventions in the project were most likely to produce positive benefits for the area.

In working with these stakeholders SRC community team was able to identify some of the needs and barriers of business, learning and employment in the county Down fishing area of Kilkeel. As a result, the team proposed the HS&J.

One core aspect in the project that was very effective, was providing one to one support to participants and endeavouring to align their needs with business needs. The aim was to ensure the participants received targeted support to assist them in improving their potential and achieving upskilling and employment.

The project provided accredited employability training to two cohorts of participants, totalling 16 participants. The project offered an array of temporary employment opportunities to the participants to meet the changing skills demands of business, such as boat laminators, print operatives, graphic designers, office administrators, stores & supplier's salespersons, accountancy administrators and hospitality personnel. Each temporary employment position was set up in partnership with local employers to open pathways to employment for the participants. The project provided the participants with qualifications and employment experience enhancing their career prospects and life opportunities.

Adam was a participant on the HS&J project. He secured employment as an Office administrator & computer operative. He said of the project,

"My objectives were met very well. I wasn't sure what to expect when working here but I've done a wide variety of tasks. Positive work atmosphere. Very close to home, 10-minute walk away made it very handy."

Aleksander Jablonowski



PROSPER was funded by the Department of Agriculture, Environment and Rural affairs. It commenced as a 6-month pilot project in September 2018 and was subsequently developed as PROSPER+, running each successive year until 31st March 2023. The programme provided accredited training leading to industry recognised qualifications and licences for economically inactive and low paid workers living within rural areas and other areas of deprivation. Training was offered across a range of occupational areas e.g. CAT C lorry driving, forklift and plant machinery operations, Computerised Bookkeeping, Customer Services, AI training, Working at Heights, Interior Design and Door Supervision training. Aspects of the project were delivered locally in outcentres across the relevant rural areas, and on SRC campuses.

Since its conception, PROSPER and PROSPER+ has enabled over 400 rural residents to achieve a recognised qualification or licence and over 30 have reported securing employment in the security, haulage and construction industries.

17-year-old Megan was the youngest female participant to avail of the Excavator Digger Operator course with Industry Training Services

Aleksander heard about the REAP programme through SRC Student Services and was keen to engage with the programme. REAP mentor engaged with Aleksander and completed a career action plan and arranged for Aleksander to complete his forklift training with Safety Lift in Dunmurry.

From mentoring session is evident that Aleksander was interested in engineering, a meeting was set up with SRC careers who identified the Level 3 Advanced Technical Programme as the correct provision for Aleksander.

Aleksander did not have much knowledge of Further Education or the local job market, making the intervention of REAP vital to ensuring Aleksander did not become termed not in education, training or employment (NEET).

Aleksander hopes in the future to continue with his studies and progression to university.

"I really enjoyed the experience and I am grateful for the opportunity to do forklift training and transition to full time education, the programme also helped me with transport and enrolling on my course"

Caitlin McComisky



Caitlin was a participant on the HS&J project. She secured employment as Hospitality personnel. She said of the project,

"My objectives were met very well. I was trained

and only the second female in ITS's 20+ year history to have completed a competency course on a machine. She comes from a farming background and is very passionate about developing a career for herself in agricultural contracting or the construction sector. Megan said of her experience "When I was informed that I was the youngest and the only female participant on the course I was slightly worried. But I told myself that there was no harm in trying something new and getting on with it. Everyone was very encouraging and supportive of me, which made learning so much easier. It was great to know that I could have an impact on other girls who didn't want to try as it is male dominated. The course itself was user friendly with everything easily laid out. The facilities down at ITS are brilliant. I'd totally recommend it and tell anyone to jump at the opportunity." Megan feels that obtaining her excavator licence will prove beneficial in whatever career path she ends up taking.

David engaged with the REAP programme after finding out about the programme through a friend who had seen SRC Marketing.

David made contact with the REAP Mentor who arranged a meeting and completed a career action plan, identifying that David was interested in full time employment. Barriers where identified regarding David's health as he was previously employed as a welder this career was having a negative effect on David's health. The Reap mentor arranged for David to complete his forklift training and arranged a job interview with a local company McMullan Fascade that where hiring a forklift driver.

David successfully completed his training, and during mentoring session practiced interview techniques. On the 15th August David started employment with McMullan Fascade as forklift driver.

"I was grateful for the opportunity to complete forklift training and for the mentoring, as I was looking for a change in direction due to health reasons, the intervention came at the right time and allowed me the opportunity to change careers".

The Tops Craigavon & Newry and STEPs Armagh projects provide industry qualifications /licences in a vast range of areas, usually depending on what is needed by employers at the time. The training in these projects usually entails CAT C lorry driving, forklift licences, CSR constructions cards, SIA Security licences, Bookkeeping, Payroll, Introduction into Autism, Children's mindfulness etc. If you are interested, contact the Community Development Officer moving furniture to providing an extra income.

STRAND 2 - DARE - focussing on people with neurodivergent conditions.

The project ensures students have better access to further education, training and employment opportunities and are fully supported to remain in provision and achieve according to everyone's full potential.

The project seeks to deliver a menu of support, mentoring and training to those with special needs. The project will be co-designed with governmental departments, Local Authorities and Colleges to ensure that employability needs for those with special needs are catered for.

In many cases, this may be a bridging or a reconnection programme for those wishing to better themselves or seek employment, either voluntary, part-time, or full time. If required, the mentor will seek work placement opportunities and training that is best suited to the needs and ambitions of the client?

Opportunities for additional training and education at local Regional Colleges/FEs will also be available.

STRAND 3 - WRAP - Women Returners Access Programme

A range of training is being developed with employers and women's groups which facilitate a return to work for women, regardless of previous educational achievement.

Clearly defined pathways feeding into current college provision, identified employer needs or self-employment will be available.

Short courses will be run in the community to engage learners and build confidence and ease the return to learning process. This will include Confidence Building, Digital Skills and Cooking.

This will then lead to a range of pathways including L2 Qualifications in Business Admin, Digital Marketing and Nail Tech. These courses will be delivered both in SRC and where necessary in the community.

Delivery will be blended and designed to facilitate childcare and travel.

SRC are currently consulting with community and voluntary organisations to codesign services.
